Room 101 All About Microcredentials (Tara Shimer)

Room 105 Neurodiversity at Work (Dr. Noor Syed (she/her) & Dr. Lauren Allen (she/her), SUNY Empire Center for Autism Advocacy)#

Autistic and Neurodivergent students are enrolling in higher education in larger numbers (Kuder & Accardo, 2018). Yet, graduation rates of disabled students continue to lag those of non-disabled peers. The implications of this discrepancy are far reaching in terms of employment and, ultimately, longer term economic and personal outcomes (Petcu et al., 2021). College and university faculty and staff agree that a critical need exists to promote the success and well-being of Autistic and Neurodivergent students. However, for many faculty and staff, knowing best how to meet the needs of these students may be difficult. The goal of this session, hosted by SUNY Empire State College's Center for Autism Advocacy: Research, Education, and Supports (CAARES), is to support a better understanding of the needs for Autistic and Neurodivergent college students and discuss universal supports for success. The presenters and audience will engage in collaborative problem solving to determine how best to support SUNY Empire students with disabilities and the pros and cons of different courses of action.

Room 117 Leading, managing, and doing! (Janet Oppedisano)

A brief presentation based on a combination of leadership resources (MOR Leaders Program, Coaching for Leaders, Harvard Business Review) that open up avenues for discussion about some of the most common, and most difficult aspects, of leading and managing. Discussion will focus on participants questions and scenarios about leadership & management. We will discuss creating plans to continue professional development in leading, managing, and being individual contributors.

Room 132 SGO Club/Organization Advisor Meeting (Goyette) *

Room 101 Everything You Always Wanted to Know About SUNY Gen Ed DEISJ* (*But Were Afraid to Ask) (Donielle Balstra, Co-chair, Senate DEIS Committee, & Kurt Reymers)

Transparency in Learning and Teaching (TILT) in Higher Ed is a resource designed to advance equitable teaching and learning practices in higher education by reducing systemic inequities (https://tilthighered.com/). In this session we will examine TILT's Transparent Assignment Template, which is intended to make assignments and activities explicitly clear to students. We will go over examples of "before and after" assignments and will work on our own assignments. Be sure to bring ideas, potential assignments, and an open mind.

Room 144 Module 1 - The Good, the Bad, and the Ugly: A Short History of Disability, Social Welfare Policy, and Law (Lesley Owens-Pelton, JD)

This module will explore the understanding of Disability from the late 1800s to present day. By tracing the contours of societal attitudes and law, a better understanding of Disability, Inclusion and Human Rights will be achieved.

Room 145 Overview of Handshake and LinkedIn Learning (Barbara Roback)

Handshake, the college's career management system, is much more than a robust jobs and internships platform, offering virtual employer information sessions, virtual career fairs, employer research tools, and virtual networking with employers and Handshake users. LinkedIn Learning provides micro courses related to the career competencies employers expect from interns/new hires and numerous technical areas. Room 101 How to Propose or Revise a Course (Rebecca Hargrave & Ashley Marshall)

Are you considering writing a new course or revising a current course but are unsure about the process? If so, this workshop is for you! Course proposals and revisions require multiple reviews and committees and take a few months to complete. This workshop will review the course proposal and revision process, go over the necessary forms, and discuss what happens at each step along the way. There will be one-on-one proposal and revision support, so bring your next great course idea with you!

ChatGPT is an AI-based chatbot system that uses natural language processing (NLP) to generate conversations. In this presentation, an overview of what ChatGPT is and how it works will be provided. We will cover the significance of this new tool and have a round table discussion on its potential impact in academia. Bring your quiz and essay questions to the presentation so we can see how ChatGPT answers them!

Room 144 Module 2 - Everything You Need to Know about Disability and Education, but were Afraid to Ask (Lesley Owens-Pelton, JD)

This module will help clarify the intersections of Disability, Education and the Law, and address that meaning within our daily lives at Morrisville.

Topics covered (among others): IDEA, AA and 504: What do these mean in college? Service Animals: What are they, where are they allowed, and will a Llama ever show up in my classroom?

Room 145 African American English and Anti-Racist Grading (Kira Brady)

During the session, I will first showcase African American English as a legitimate, intelligent, and valuable language that can be (and has long been) used to engage in academic discourse. Next, participants will learn about specific aspects of African American English including verb transformation, tense markers, and morpheme deletions. Using writing samples pulled from student essays, we will evaluate how to recognize these common AAE grammar rules in student writing. More importantly, we will discuss when it is and is not appropriate for General American English speakers to "correct" AAE variations, especially as these corrections pertain to grading academic writing and determining student achievement.

Did you know that promotion works differently for academics and professionals? If you are in a UUP professional title, it's important to know and understand these differences as spelled out in the UUP contract with NYS and in the SUNY Board of Trustees Policies.
